### **Course Description**

This is study of central issues in Polish literature and culture in their historical context. These issues include: Poland between the spheres of Western and Eastern cultures, concepts of personal and national selfhood (i.e. Individualism vs. civic values, universal vs. local values, traditional vs. modern – and “postmodern” – values), Interactions between art and literature or philosophy and literature.

### **Learning Objectives**

- to explore the variety of cultural patterns created within Polish literature
- to interpret Polish literature and culture within its European context
- to find out which historical ideas, themes and styles seem to remain attractive for the contemporary culture

### **Course Prerequisites:**

Interest in literature

### **Methods of Instruction:**

Lectures and discussions

### **Assessment and Final Grade:**

The final course grade will be determined based on the following distribution:

- Active participation in class (15%)
- Mid-term essay (20%)
- Final essay (30%)
- Presentation (20%)
- Quizzes (15%)



## Course Requirements

### Participation in class:

Students are expected to actively take part in class discussions and present their familiarity with the readings and well as their individual interpretations of the works of literature.

### Mid-term essay:

In the middle of the term students will be required to write an essay on one of the topics covered in the first part of the course. All the papers will be passed through the antiplagiarism system.

### Final Essay:

Each student is required to write an extended essay (around 10 000 words) on one of the topics related to the course. All the papers will be passed through the antiplagiarism system.

### Presentation:

Each student will present a chosen topic and discuss it during the class

### Quizzes:

During the course there will be two 15-minute quizzes checking the knowledge of the topics and readings covered in the course so far.
