Course description

This course is designed to provide students with basic knowledge to ask for and give directions, talk about past habits and events, present pros and cons of a given topic, give suggestions, make assumptions or express doubts. During this course, students will focus on grammar, but they will also spend time studying and analyzing specific aspects of Italian cities' social and cultural life, traditions and holidays. At the end of the course, students will also be asked to present a photographic map of Ferrara through which recall faces, colors, monuments of the city and present the highlights of their study abroad experience.

Course Content

Grammar:

Pluperfect tense;
plural and irregular nouns;
verb "dovere" used in different contexts;
object pronouns;
present conditional;
irregular present conditional;
past subjunctive;
interrogative statement.

Topics, vocabulary:

famous movies on Italian culture;
social and cultural dynamics in different Italian cities; Italian dialects;
pollution and recycling in Italy;
the evolution of "traditional" family in Italy; Italian holidays; contemporary Italian cinema.

Learning objectives

This course is designed for students who can understand isolated sentences and frequently used expressions, for example basic information about a person.
By the end of this course, students will be able to:



- communicate during daily activities which request simple dialogues about usual and familiar topics,
- describe some aspects of their own life, surroundings and immediate needs using simple words; -read and understand texts about daily topics, find the main information, sentences and phrases frequently used;
- write simple texts about familiar topics or personal letters to present their experiences and opinions.

Course Prerequisites

Italian Intermediate I level.

Methods of Instruction

The course will be taught in Italian. The teaching methods will include use of the textbook, video and audio materials plus other written sources. In addition to lectures and traditionally structured lessons, the course will feature fieldtrips and walking tours.

Course Requirements

Homework

Students will have written assignments to check their progress. The topics will be connected to those studied in class.

Oral Presentation

Students will use simple sentences to recap one or more topics studied during the course and present their opinions and thoughts about them. They can use PowerPoint, videos, recordings, etc., At the end of the presentations, students will ask questions and discuss about each oral project.

Midterm Exam

Students will take a written exam after the first half of the course in order to check their progress, improve their skills and learn from their mistakes.

Final Exam

Students will take a final exam at the end of the course. The exam will include all topics analyzed in class.

Class Participation

Participation means attention and respect. You are expected to arrive to class on time not only to avoid an absence, but also to avoid disrupting the class. Late assignments will be marked down 5% after the first day and 1% every day afterwards. No coursework will be accepted after the last day of class.
